Speaking of the weather, we are in the prime time for stockpiling forages for late fall and winter grazing. Applying 40-100 units of N per acre can produce a lot of forage in a few months. University of KY researchers have shown that you can get as much as 24.4 lbs. of dry matter for every pound of nitrogen applied. Of course there is an upper limit to that seeing that they recommend no more than 100 lbs. of N per acre. If you have any questions about stockpiling forages for winter, give us a call.

You'll notice in this newsletter that the CAIP sign ups have begun. Please pay close attention to when they are available as well as the process for turning it back in. This is a great program that has made lots of difference for Agriculture in Hart County.

I hope everyone stays safe as we progress into the harvest season. If you need anything please don't hesitate to give us a call.

BQCA Certification FREE in September 2024


The Kentucky Beef Network and University of Kentucky Extension are pleased to announce that they will be offering free Beef Quality and Care Assurance (BQCA) certifications in September 2024.

The Kentucky BQCA program takes national BQA practices one step further to provide a holistic program for Kentucky producers, by adding cattle handling and animal care components to the training modules. Educational modules provide the best management practices for handling cattle and providing for their well-being, in addition to training on the core principles of BQA.

The cost of BQCA enrollment is \$5 for in person training through their local county extension office and \$10 for online training, however from September 1-30, 2024 the Kentucky Beef Network and University of Kentucky Extension will be sponsoring the enrollment costs, making it free for producers.

Plastic Pesticide Container Recycling Guidelines

- 1. Triple rinse or pressure rinse all containers when emptied. Remember, it is best to rinse containers immediately after they are emptied. Some pesticide residues solidify quickly, and become difficult to remove from the container if left in the jug.
- Dispose of the Pesticide Caps and remove sleeves and labels from containers.The Pesticide Caps are made of different plastic material that cannot currently be recycled.
- Each empty pesticide container returned will be inspected to ensure it has been properly rinsed.
 Unrinsed containers will not be accepted.



Fall Frost and Freeze Information for The Bluegrass State



As we move through the month October, the risk of crop-killing frosts and hard freezes will quickly increase. The National Weather Service office in La Crosse, WI, compiled the following list of meteorological conditions that can lead to frost conditions:

- Clear skies lead to radiational cooling, allowing the greatest amount of heat to exit into the atmosphere.
- Calm to light winds prevent stirring of the atmosphere, which allows a thin layer of super-cooled temperatures to develop at the surface. These super-cooled temperatures can be up to 10 degrees cooler than five to six feet above the surface, where observations are typically taken.
 This is why frost develops even when reported temperatures are a few degrees above freezing.
- Cool temperatures, with some moisture, that promote ice crystal development. If the
 supercooled, freezing temperatures can cool to the dew point (the temperature at which, when
 cooled to at constant pressure, condensation occurs; moisture will have to come out of the
 atmosphere as fog, frost, etc.) frost could develop on exposed surfaces.
- Local topography also has a large role in determining if and where frost develops. Cold air will settle in the valleys since cold air is heavier than warm air, therefore frost conditions are more prone in these regions. Valleys are also sheltered from stronger winds, enhancing the potential for frost.

Other local effects, such as soil moisture and temperature, and stage of vegetation "greenness", are factors that can affect the possibility of frost forming. The Midwest Regional Climate Center has put together a map of when Kentucky can typically expect to see the first 32 degree freeze of the season. The great majority of the commonwealth will see the first hard freeze during the last 10 days of October, but this can vary a week or two sooner or later depending on the set-up for that particular year.

Fall Spiced Pumpkin Bread

½ cup all-purpose flour1¼ cup whole-wheat flour1½ teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda

2 teaspoons
pumpkin pie spice
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup melted
margarine
½ cup sugar

½ cup honey
2 cups pumpkin puree
⅓ cup olive oil
2 eggs
⅓ cup chopped
walnuts

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix flours, baking powder, baking soda, pumpkin spice and salt; set aside. In a large mixing bowl, whisk together margarine, sugar, honey, pumpkin puree and olive oil. Blend in eggs. Add flour mixture. Stir until dry ingredients are moistened. Spray a 8-by-4 inch loaf pan with non-stick cooking spray. Pour batter into pan; sprinkle walnuts on top of batter. Bake for 1 hour. Remove from oven

and **cover** with foil. **Return** to oven and **bake** an additional 20 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. **Cool** for 10 minutes and **remove** from pan.

Yield: 16 slices
